## 2.913 Change to Policy 1014, Nondiscrimination Policy — Second Reading

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX) was signed into law more than 50 years ago. Since that time the law has been updated and implementation of the law has been periodically changed.

On April 19, 2024, the U.S. Department of Education released its latest set of regulations to fully effectuate Title IX's promise that no person experiences sex discrimination in federally funded education. This latest set of regulations draws on the Department's engagement with tens of thousands of students, parents, educators, State government representatives, advocates, lawyers, researchers, and representatives from elementary schools, secondary schools, and postsecondary institutions.

Alpena Community College is now making changes to its policies and procedures as part of the effort to adhere to the new regulations. The first step in that process is to modify the College's nondiscrimination policy. Other changes will be implemented over the coming year with the help of College Attorney Karen Bennett.

Following is the text of the current Policy 1014, Nondiscrimination Policy, with proposed edits highlighted in red.

The ACC Board of Trustees approved the first reading of the policy change at the August 15, 2024, board meeting. College officials now offer the policy change as a second reading.

### 1014 Nondiscrimination Policy

#### A. TITLE IX — NONDISCRIMINATION ON THE BASIS OF SEX

## **2.914 Addition of New Policy 7009A, Amendment to Sexual Misconduct Policy 7009 — First Reading**

As referenced earlier in this document, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX) was signed into law more than 50 years ago. Periodically the U.S. Department of Education issues new guidance for colleges on how to implement Title IX rules. On April 19, 2024, the U.S. Department of Education released its latest final rule to fully effectuate Title IX's promise that no person experiences sex discrimination in federally funded education.

The Department of Education has determined that the new final rules will go into effect on August 1, 2024.

Alpena Community College Attorney Karen Bennett has tracked the U.S. Department of Education's official rule progress and has worked diligently to evaluate ACC's current sexual misconduct policy in light of the new Title IX rules. She is currently working to finalize a new policy which will amend ACC's current sexual misconduct policy (Policy 7009), but the new policy was not complete at the time of distribution of this agenda. Board Secretary Walterreit will work with Bennett to circulate the final version of the new policy (Policy 7009A) when it is available, which is anticipated to be Monday, September 16, 2024.

**2.915 Local Strategic Value Resolution**

Each year the Governor of Michigan signs a bill into law that provides funding for K-12 schools, community colleges and state universities. The bill includes an appropriation for Alpena Community College which includes an amount for performance funding.

The performance funding is based on “local strategic value,” which is defined in terms of three categories as shown below. Each category covers five standards of local strategic value. The law requires the ACC Board of Trustees to pass a resolution certifying that the college meets at least four out of five of the best practice standards under each of the three categories.

Alpena Community College not only meets but also exceeds the best practice standards required by the appropriations law, as the following table demonstrates.

**Category A: Economic Development and Business or Industry Partnerships (must meet 4 of 5)**

The Alpena Community College Board of Trustees certifies that the College does meet the local strategic value standards required for state appropriations.

## **2.916 Purchase of Used Utility Arborist Bucket Truck**

Alpena Community College and the utility arborist industry recognize the critical role played by utility arborists in maintaining and enhancing power grid reliability in rural communities. ACC plans to expand the Utility Arborist certificate program through the purchase of a used utility arborist bucket truck.

The addition of the used bucket truck for the Utility Arborist certificate program will continue to expand opportunities for ACC students as well as support extensive chainsaw and bucket operations safety trainings for the utility arborist industry through the MI-OSHA Consultation Education and Training Grant. Walt Wiltse, ACC Utility Arborist Instructor will facilitate UA classes for students and trainings in the community.

College officials plan to locate and purchase one quality used utility arborist bucket truck. This type of vehicle is in high demand and they often sell quickly when they go on the market. Initial research indicates the cost of a gently used bucket truck to be approximately \$120,000.

In June 2024, Alpena Community College was awarded a \$100,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) Rural Development Grant for the purchase of a utility arborist bucket truck which will fund the majority of the purchase. As required, ACC will contribute \$30,500 of general fund and state appropriated ITEMS (Infrastructure, Technology, Equipment, Maintenance, and Safety) dollars for the remainder of the purchase.

To facilitate a quick sale, College officials are asking the Board of Trustees to pre-approve the purchase of one utility arborist bucket truck at a cost not to exceed \$125,000.

Therefore, the following resolution is proposed:

The Alpena Community College Board of Trustees pre-approves the purchase of one utility arborist bucket truck at a cost not to exceed \$125,000.

## 2.917 Bids: Oscoda Campus Lecture/Videoconferencing Room Improvements

Alpena Community College officials have determined that upgrading the videoconferencing and audio/video capabilities at the Oscoda Campus is desirable to facilitate expanded instructional and community use. To accomplish this task, College officials created a Request for Proposals (RFP) requesting bids for equipment, design, and implementation of a lecture/video room for Oscoda Campus room 213.

Specifications include:

- The room configuration must be designed to be fully compatible with Cisco Webex software and hardware. The college will purchase and provide the necessary Cisco equipment for the project as well as any required network cabling external to this room, per the recommendation of the vendor.
- The vendor will be responsible for all other aspects of the room, including the layout, installation, and provision of non-Cisco equipment such as televisions, speakers, microphone arrays, etc.
- Ceiling mount speakers and ceiling mount microphones for presenter and audience.
- At least two (2) front and two (2) rear displays.
- Front camera to capture audience, rear camera to capture presenter.
- Audio controls must integrate with Cisco system and be controlled from the Cisco touchpad/navigator.
- System should include two HDMI inputs with ability to switch between them.
- All cabling to connect equipment in the room.
- All mounting brackets.
- Large or rack mounted equipment should be placed in the storage room.

The deadline for bid submission was Friday, September 13, at 12:00 p.m.

Only one bid, from RoomReady of Normal, Illinois, was received. Following is a breakdown of RoomReady's bid:

College officials have determined that RoomReady's bid meets the minimum specifications and recommend that ACC contract with them for the Oscoda Campus room 213 project.

As mentioned in the specifications, ACC will provide the Cisco Webex equipment for the project because ACC receives favorable pricing from Cisco as a preferred customer. ACC requested an equipment quote from CDW-G. The total cost of the Cisco Webex equipment is \$23,014.46.

Total cost of the room upgrade and the Cisco equipment is \$81,694.47. This project would be fully funded by the Alpena Community College FIPSE Oscoda Campus Improvement Project Grant.

Therefore, the following resolution is proposed:

The Alpena Community College Board of Trustees authorizes ACC officials to contract with RoomReady of Normal, Illinois, for videoconferencing upgrades for the Oscoda Campus room 213 for a cost not to exceed \$58,680.01 and to purchase Cisco Webex equipment from CDW-G for a cost not to exceed \$23,014.46.

#### 4.127 Financial Report

##### Monthly General Fund Revenue and Expense through August 2024 (Year-to-Year Actual Comparison)

- The property tax receipts of \$673,627 are \$30,174 more than those for August 2023.
- Tuition/fee receipts of \$3,763,985 are \$383,249 more than last year primarily due to an increase in the number of billable contact hours.
- State aid for the current year is comparable to last year and is typical for this time of year. Regular monthly revenue from the state is expected to resume when the state fiscal year begins in October.
- Interest is higher this year compared to last year because of the way the College invests its funds. We are now taking full advantage of the higher rates available through deposits and savings.
- Instructional expenses are up due to the timing for the hiring of new faculty as well as having fewer pays this year compared to last year.
- Net income through the first two months of the year shows as a gain of \$2,146,286 which is typical for this time of year as fall tuition revenue has built up.

##### Monthly General Fund Revenue and Expense through August 2024 (Budget-to-Actual Comparison)

- Advertising is up slightly due to the timing of expenses.
- All categories are in acceptable ranges for this stage of the year except as noted above.

##### General Fund Month-to-Month Comparison through August 2024

- The Month-to-Month comparisons are tracking as expected except as noted above.
