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
### **Success Comes in Many Forms**

While attending a downstate press conference at the invitation of Governor Whitmer to discuss the ice storm that devastated the region this past spring, I was startled to hear someone call my name from the crowd.

"Dr. MacMaster," a young friendly face inquired, coming over to shake my hand. "Remember me?"

I did remember him. It was Mikhail Perkins, a former ACC student I met during my first year as President more than 10 years ago. Recruited to play basketball at ACC, Mikhail and I enjoyed many conversations that year — first about hoops then about life off the court. He was bright and ambitious and aspired to become a lawyer. I remembered he told me then how much he enjoyed his ACC academic experience, particularly his classes with

government and social sciences instructor Tim Kuehnlein. One assignment inspired him to turn in an award-winning paper and subsequently led to a well-

attended public presentation to the community. A decade later that lesson still resonated with him. I asked him how he was doing. He said after graduating from ACC he transferred to MSU, later graduated from law school, and was now working for Governor Whitmer in the Executive Office of the Governor. He was married with two youngsters. Grinning he told me he was beginning to take them to the park to teach them basketball — the full circle of life.

"I want to thank you," Mikhail said to me as I entered the ice storm media scrum around the Governor. "ACC changed my life."

#### **Recent ACC Successes**

With a projected fall semester enrollment of nearly 1,600 students, success comes in almost as many forms as we have students. But there are common themes that do tend to lead to student success: purpose, focus, resilience, timely support, and sustained inspired effort. While certainly not a complete list, here are three recent examples of ACC students doing good work that deserves the spotlight.

## MATE International ROV Competition

On June 19-21, 2025, the Marine Advanced Technical Education (MATE) worldwide Remote-Operated Vehicle (ROV) robotics competition came to Alpena, hosted by Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary with events at ACC. Teams from 22 countries and 18 states came to town to compete with underwater robots they designed and built themselves. ACC fielded a team as well — the Aquajacks — who with the guidance of ACC instructor

David Cummins did a beautiful job building a functioning underwater robot in a short period of time that allowed them to finish third in the world in their category. It was a pleasure watching the team work together. They did well in their engineering presentation where they had to explain to a three-member panel of ROV experts how they designed their submersible and the problems they had to overcome. Then at the pool, industry leaders remarked how well the team worked together, highlighting specifically the thought they'd put into the design features of their ROV that paid off in the pool. It was a pleasure watching them work and hearing these observations from employers who deploy deepwater ROV exploration teams around the world. Kudos to the Aquajacks!

## **Lineman Rodeo Returns to Alpena Campus**

The 2025 National College Lineman Rodeo was held at ACC on Friday, April 25. Twelve teams from three states came to campus to compete in a variety of lineman skills challenges, including cross arm change outs, obstacle climbs, framing a C-1 structure, and a lineman knowledge exam. ACC fielded three teams with Jake Giesige winning the best overall lineman award. Beyond highlighting their lineman skills, the competition brought pride and healing to a community that needed a shot of inspiration after nearly a month dealing with the aftermath of the historically destructive ice storm. Led by instructors Roy Smith, Paul Gamage, Todd Artley, Rick Smith,

Dane Werth, and Wesley Repke, the ACC teams helped turn the lights back on for the community at the Lineman's Rodeo event. Thank you to the Utility Tech lineworker students and their mentors!

#### Dellar Becomes ACC's First ADN-to-BSN Graduate

In May, Nursing student Carmen Dellar from Alcona County became the first ACC student to earn her Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree through ACC's partnership with Saginaw Valley State University. An award-winning athlete during her freshman year at ACC, Carmen decided to forego sports to focus on maximizing the opportunity the BSN partnership provides. Working hard, Carmen completed her BSN as she was completing her RN program, earning both credentials simultaneously, and was hired by MyMichigan Alpena to begin work in the Intensive Care unit. ### Active Spring and Summer Semesters Lead to a Great Fall

As we prepare for the fall semester it is beneficial to look back over the spring and summer activities on campus. There are many things which have been happening to prepare for the fall start up.

The Linesman Rodeo in April was a great event which brought teams from across the country to compete in events related to the Utility Technology program. The faculty, staff, alumni, and community were all involved and made this a very successful event which brought well-deserved attention to one of our premier programs.

The MATE ROV World Competition that was held in mid-June in Alpena provided an opportunity for ACC students to excel at an international event. The college campus was energized by the presence of teams from around the world with students

staying on campus and parts of the competition taking place in our classrooms. The ACC team, mentored by David Cummins, built a competitive robot and placed third in the Pioneer Class where 14 teams competed (including schools from the United States, Egypt, Canada, Saudi Arabia, and Bangladesh).

On August 6 over 80 educators from across Northeast Michigan came together for the Huron Shores Ed Tech Conference, hosted at Alpena Community College. The day-long event offered teachers, instructional staff, and administrators hands-on professional development focused on the integration of technology in the classroom. Meghan Cameron, Instructor of Mathematics at Alpena Community College, worked with a team to coordinate this event.

The week of August 11 saw the return to campus of a youth police academy. Numerous police agencies worked together to provide the participants an opportunity to learn more about the criminal justice field and career opportunities available at the local, county, and state levels.

A unique opportunity occurred this summer for three of the Electrical Systems Technology students. They have been contributing to the project management aspects for the College's upcoming solar array. This has included working with the installer (Harvest Solar), Alpena Power, the City of Alpena, ACC staff, and the Alpena Disc Golf Club to facilitate the application/permitting processes, site prep, and relocation of several disc golf holes to make room for the array.

New equipment and computer software has been installed over the

summer and will provide more tools for the students.

ACC's Automotive Technology program has had several additions over the summer. We are very grateful to Alpena High School who donated a Pontiac Solstice to the program. Dustin Ruehle, our automotive technology instructor, obtained a Corvette engine that his class will rebuild and install into the car. An electric vehicle charger was also wired up in the ACC shop for the EV/Hybrid class and another hoist will be installed soon.

The Welding program recently received funding to purchase a diesel-powered portable welder. Many of our students end up welding in the pipeline and ironworker construction industry. These types of machines are very common in those industries and now ACC students can begin to learn on those specific machines starting this Fall. This will make them more skilled and prepared to hit the ground running.

The Oscoda Nursing program has a new medical cart that replicates medication distribution in a hospital setting. The students scan information to indicate what medications are needed for

particular patients. Once the correct information is entered the cart opens the appropriate drawer holding the approved medication. The nursing students and faculty will also be using a new learning platform that allows for better tracking of student progress, more student resources, and cost savings to the students.

Several faculty members in the Social Sciences and English departments will be using Grammarly/Authorship for Higher Education this fall, with plans to expand more broadly to the curriculum where appropriate in the

future. Grammarly helps students explore, construct, and polish writing assignments. It's a great tool for helping coach students along the way, including helping clean up writing, grammar, and additionally documenting source materials when used in an assignment where appropriate and necessary.


Over the summer a number of faculty work in their occupational fields. This provides faculty with an opportunity to keep current in their skill areas and bring back new ideas that will be incorporated into ACC's programs. This summer faculty

were active in electrical and utility trades, nursing, historical research, and other areas. Faculty also attended conferences and training opportunities. They did also had some time for fun!

Many things occur over the summer which show the progress at the College and to the excitement of a new academic year. We look forward to starting the year with new faculty and staff on campus, new equipment, facility upgrades, and most importantly the return of our students.

That's why Alpena Community College is proud to introduce an exciting new chapter for what was previously known as Workforce Development. Moving forward, we'll operate under the name Workforce Training and Development — a title that more clearly reflects our mission to provide focused, practical training for today's workplace.

This past year was a strong reminder of what's possible when education and community work hand in hand.

In May, we celebrated the graduation of 20 new firefighters from our Fire Academy after completing eight months of rigorous training.

In June, our Corrections
Academy welcomed 16
corrections officers from 12
different Michigan counties,
offering vital skills to support
public safety in our region. In
addition, we delivered over
90 hours of grant-funded
safety training to nearly

400 area employees on critical topics such as OSHA 10, Tree Crew Trauma, High Angle Rescue, and Lockout/Tagout procedures. These efforts are only the beginning.

community-based trainings, which will include everything from Microsoft Excel and photography to customer service, leadership, and workplace communication.

at all stages of their careers, whether they're sharpening current skills, exploring new interests, or preparing for a career change. Our mission remains clear: to provide accessible, high-quality training that supports both individual success and regional economic growth.

### ACC Athletics Looks Back on a Successful 2024-25 Year

This is my third annual report on athletics. It has been a fun ride over these last three years as we have added new sports, new staff and a new vibe in ACC athletics. This upcoming year, 2025-26, will be an exciting one with the addition of three new sports: men's and women's soccer, and women's cross country.

As of this writing, we will have 81 new student-athletes at ACC for 2025-26! When I started in athletics, we did not even have that many athletes total in our program.

This spring and summer we spent a lot of time interviewing and hiring coaches; those coaches have been busy recruiting to build entire rosters from scratch. We have been processing the eligibility and compliance paperwork for our athletes and helping them get acclimated.

For the 2024-25 academic year, we had 88 students participate in intercollegiate athletics at ACC. Eight of them were dual sport athletes competing in two different sports. This is up from 64 in 2022-23 and 78 in 2023-24.



#### **Academic Success**

Our student-athletes had a tremendous year in the classroom, posting a 2.9 GPA as a group. Fortyfour (over ½) of our student-athletes achieved a 3.0 GPA or higher and thus received MCCAA Academic All-Conference recognition.

Five student-athletes — Abigail Platt (women's basketball), Benedikt Purat (cross country), Carter Upper (cross country), Grant Slater (baseball) and A.J. Wheelock (baseball) earned perfect 4.0 GPAs for the year. For Grant, it was his second straight year with a 4.0.

In addition, four ACC teams — men's cross country (3.48), women's basketball (3.38), men's basketball (3.12) and softball (3.06) earned MCCAA All-Academic Team honors for posting team GPAs higher than

3.0. The volleyball and baseball teams narrowly missed recognition with team GPAs of 2.95 and 2.94 respectively. The MCCAA does not recognize eSports as a conference sport.

In the fall, 26 student-athletes were named to the ACC Dean's List with a GPA of 3.5 or better. In the spring, 24 achieved this distinction.

#### Athletic Success

The most successful sport in competition at ACC was our newest – eSports. The two-person Fortnite team posted a perfect 8-0 record while our two-person Call of Duty

Gunfight team was 6-7.

Our men's cross country team had a solid season to top off Mark Jacobs' coaching career as he retired after the season and was honored at halftime of a home basketball game in the winter. The team was third in the Northern Conference

and finished ninth out of 15 teams in the regional championships.
Ryan Allen (Reed City) earned All-Northern Conference honors.

The volleyball team, our other fall sport, struggled a bit under new coach Courtney Holmes and finished 1-9 in the conference and 1-14 overall. Lillian Adams (West Branch) and Raquelle Miller (Mio) were named all-conference honorable mention.

In the winter, the women's basketball team was 4-18 overall and 3-11 conference in coach Karl Momrik's

first season. Saige Flaugher (Hillman) was named 3rd team all-conference as well as to the MCCAA Northern Conference All-Freshman team.

The men's basketball team was 2-21 overall and 1-13 conference in coach Bobby Allen's fifth season as head men's coach and 23rd as a head coach overall at ACC. Derian Williams (New Haven) was third team all-conference as well as making the all-freshman team. Robert Williams (Grand Blanc) was named All-Northern Conference honorable mention.

Coach Drew Ornelas' softball team was solid in the spring, posting a 17-23 overall record and going 12-13 in the conference. The team qualified for postseason play and won two games in the super regionals but fell in the semifinals, just two wins from qualifying for the national tournament.

Kirsten Neubecker (West Branch) earned a number of awards: NJCAA Region 12 All-Region Team, NJCAA Region 12 Great Lakes B All-Tournament team, All-MCCAA, 1st team All-Northern Conference and Northern Conference All-Freshman team.


She was not alone earning accolades as Emilee Modrzejewski (Alpena) was All-MCCAA team, 1st team All-Northern Conference and Northern Conference All-Freshman team. Alaina Neubecker (West Branch) was NJCAA Region 12 Great Lakes B All-Tournament team and 2nd team All-Northern Conference.

Kenna Tippman (Venice, FL) was 1st team All-Northern Conference. Jordan Ashley (Cheboygan), Faith Cousins (Posen), Magdalyn Sandoval (Grand Rapids), Taylor Krentz (Rogers City) and Dakota Rachow (West Branch) all received all-conference honorable mention.

The ACC baseball team continued to improve in its third season under coach Rob Enslen's leadership after a 50-year respite. The team won 16 games, going 16-31 overall, 11-14 conference. The squad has steadily improved in the conference winning 3, 4, and 11 games over those three years respectively, and 4, 11, and 16 overall. The Lumberjacks missed a playoff spot by two games.

Jake Zann (Alpena) had a tremendous year and was

rewarded by being named Northern Conference Player of the Year by conference coaches. He also was named All-Region, All-MCCAA, All-Northern Conference First Team and Northern Conference All-Freshman Team.

Max Coughlin (Midland) was also All-Region, All-MCCAA and All-Northern Conference 1st Team. Grant Slater (Petoskey) was 2nd Team All-Northern Conference while Jacob Brohl (Utica), Evan Fairbanks (Rogers City), Nate Koster (Mt. Pleasant) and Max McCarty (Belding) all received all-conference honorable mention.

#### **Athletic Support and Fundraising**

During 2022-23, my first year at ACC, we engaged in no fundraising. A very generous gift from the ACC Foundation allowed us to support athletics, including starting the baseball program.

For 2023-24, we raised \$68,945 through the ACC Athletic Partnership and ACC Lumberjack Club programs. Individual sports raised \$15,565 on their own for a total of \$84,510.

This past year, we increased our total number to \$97,657 with \$53,988 coming in through our athletic department-wide endeavors and \$43,735 coming in through sport-specific fundraisers or donations.

These gifts allowed us to pay for spring trips to South Carolina for the softball team and Tennessee for the baseball team, as well as backpacks, uniforms, travel wear and practice wear for all of our student athletes as well as "big ticket" items for athletics.

## Oscoda Campus: Joint Ventures Matter

"Staying Adaptive" was the challenge area identified by the Alpena Community College Oscoda Campus as our best progressive operational approach for last year. This organizational position served our campus well as we initiated and completed projects in several continuous improvement areas. Following are some of the challenges we addressed in 2024-25.

As the 2024-25 fiscal year ends so does the three-year Alpena Community College-Oscoda Campus Improvement Project funded by the U.S. Department of Education. Specific project initiatives completed include:

- The addition of a Physical Assessment Lab
- Receipt of donated nursing training equipment from community sources
- Upgrades to video conferencing classrooms for expanded student training options
- Improvements to student disability accessibility and facility upgrades
- Creation of a new science prep lab and related training supplies area.
- Enhancements of nursingrelated, technology-based learning components

Completing those initiatives were an important part of "staying adaptive" last year.

Another project that saw progressive advancement was the establishment of a more regular Nurse Assistant Training Program. This included partnering with H-CAP (Healthcare Career Advancement Program) to help recruit and cover students' costs related to the training.

Finally, with the multiple challenges facing local companies and organizations, the ACC Oscoda Campus continued its LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS initiative with Develop losco (DI) the county's economic development agency. The LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS component especially promotes a specific ACC training opportunity most requested by the regional community and thereby cooperatively promoted by DI and the ACC Oscoda Campus.

#### Oscoda Campus 2025-26 Goals

"Joint Ventures Matter" will be the ACC Oscoda Campus continuous improvement theme for the 2025-26 semester period. In support of this theme, the following goals are planned:

 Re-start the John Deere Precision Optimization Clinic special agri-business



Kari Seelye Schellie ('96) was a lifelong learner and a passionate marketing professional whose career spanned more than 25 years and crossed continents. Known for her expertise in marketing, strategic planning, and team building, Kari worked across North America, Europe, Central America, Australia, Russia, and China. She began her career close to home at Besser Company in Alpena, steadily advancing to become their director of marketing & information technology. Her career path later took her to leadership roles at Meijer, Behler-Young, and finally ETNA Supply Company, where she served as their director of marketing.

Kari's commitment to education was as strong as her professional drive. An Alpena Community College alumna, Kari went on to earn her bachelor's degree from Spring Arbor University, a master's

degree from National University, and a digital marketing certificate from Michigan State University—achieved in 2021, late in her career, underscoring her belief in continuous learning.

Kari's dedication to service extended well beyond the workplace. As public relations and community service chair for the Rotary Club of Grand Haven, she poured her energy into projects that made a tangible difference in the community, bringing people together and inspiring action.

When Kari passed away in May 2024, her family and friends sought a meaningful way to carry on her legacy. The result was the creation of the Kari Seelye

Schellie Scholarship in Marketing at Alpena Community College. This scholarship supports students pursuing marketing careers, helping them follow in Kari's footsteps by embracing lifelong learning and striving to make meaningful contributions in their chosen fields.

Memorial scholarships like Kari's channel grief into the opportunity to make a positive difference in the lives of others. ## Getting Started at ACC

#### **Applying**

Alpena Community College grants admission to all persons who have earned a high school diploma or GED, or who are 18 years of age or older and who demonstrate the ability to benefit from a particular program of study. You can contact the ACC Admissions Office at 989.358.7339. You can also apply online at www.alpenacc.edu. Complete and submit your application for free; there is no application fee at ACC.

#### **Financial Aid**

Apply for financial aid as soon as you decide to take courses. Submit the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid** (FAFSA) online as soon as possible. Apply online at www.fafsa.gov and authorize electronic release of the results (called the Student Aid Report or SAR) to ACC by including our code number, 002237.

#### **Assessment**

Information for placement testing is located on page 8. Students can complete their placement testing at either our Alpena or Oscoda campus. It's free; there is no charge for ACC placement assessment. The ACCUPLACER test can be waived if you have a sub score of 18 or higher on the ACT in the areas of Math, Reading and English, or SAT scores of 25 or higher in Reading, Writing, and Language; 26.5 or higher in Mathematics.

#### Orientation/Registration

All new students must attend a mandatory orientation session where they will meet with an advisor, register for classes, and get a better feel for college expectations. Your advisor will help you plan what courses you need to take to achieve your academic goals. Choose the most convenient orientation time either online or on our Alpena Campus. Bring the registration form that you and your advisor filled out. Turn it in and be ready to pay the tuition and fees for your course(s).

Yes, at this step, you do have to pay whatever balance remains after any financial aid you are receiving is applied. Even so, ACC's rates are affordable ... and parking is free!

#### **Books**

The ACC Bookstore has your textbooks, course supplies and ACC clothing and accessories. The Bookstore will have extended hours during Central Registration and the first week of classes. Many of the Bookstore services are available online.

### Get a Head Start on College with Dual Enrollment Courses

Dual enrollment is a great way for high school students to earn college credits and take classes not offered by high schools. Under ACC's Dual Enrollment Program, eligible high school students may enroll in approved ACC classes and the local school district pays all tuition. ACC encourages interested high school students and parents to contact their high school principal or guidance counselor for eligibility guidelines and dual enrollment information.

For a number of years ACC has also accepted enrollment by high school seniors who have a recommendation from the school principal or counselor but do not qualify for dual enrollment. Concurrently enrolled high school students are responsible for payment of all tuition and fees.

## **Admissions Policy**

Alpena Community College grants admission to all persons who have earned a high school Diploma, Certificate of Completion or GED, or who are 18 years of age or older, and who demonstrate the ability to benefit from a particular program of study. Ability to benefit may be demonstrated by those who:

- Have satisfactory skills\* as measured by institutional placement testing for reading, language and numerical skills or
- 2. Can produce Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) test score results of 500 or better when coming from a non-English speaking country.

The age requirement is waived for a high school student who:

- 1. Is a dually enrolled high school student\* as provided for by the State School Aid Act, as amended, or
- Is certified as having attained junior status toward graduation as determined by the high school or the home schooling association issuing the diploma. College course enrollment will be determined in accordance with the Alpena Community College ACCUPLACER placement test results for reading, language, and numerical skills.
- \* Interested high school students should contact their high school principal or guidance counselor for further information.

This admissions policy applies to admission to the College only and is intended to assure students of both opportunity and quality in programs. Admission to a specific curriculum or course is based on student interest, achievement, and test scores necessary for preparation to enter a specific program or course.

## Michigan Transfer Agreement

Alpena Community College participates in the Michigan Transfer Agreement between public and private community colleges and universities in Michigan.

This agreement provides ACC students more assurance of having completed their general education requirements when they transfer to a participating four-year college or university. Working closely with your academic advisor is recommended to assure meeting MTA requirements. To fulfill the Michigan Transfer Agreement, students must successfully complete at least 30 credits, with at least a 2.0 in each course.

To be eligible for the Michigan Transfer Agreement at Alpena Community College, a Minimum of 1 college level course must be taken at Alpena Community College. Transcripts of ACC graduates who meet the MTA requirements will automatically be certified for MTA when degrees are posted to academic records. Students who transfer prior to the completion of a degree program but have completed the MTA requirements may also be certified upon request. Requests should be made to the Registrar, 108 Van Lare Hall.






