MICHIGAN WORKS! NORTHEAST MICHIGAN CONSORTIUM AND ACC were recently awarded a Michigan Learning and Education Advancement Program (MiLEAP) grant from the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth to respond to the economic impact of COVID-19 and help job-seekers gain skills and transition from education and training to high skill, high wage employment, resulting in an industry-recognized credential. This training will also upscale existing employees. Michigan Works and Alpena Community College have partnered to provide this funding to those who qualify. Career navigators will help participants set career goals, identify relevant education and training opportunities, and complete requirements for college admissions and financial aid.

Our MiLEAP Career Navigator, Mary Trudgen, will provide eligible clients with assistance in assessing and overcoming barriers, identifying resources, and providing guidance and support.

Employed by Michigan Works! Northeast Consortium, Mary will

be on campus full-time, meeting with students, staff and faculty to build awareness of MiLEAP funded projects as well as all services available through Michigan Works. She will provide new enrollment and support for the training funded by MiLEAP, including IT, Manufacturing, Utility Line Clearance and Mobility.
