#### ACC Student Olivia Hemker ('22) Earns State Honors

As one of five kids, Olivia Hemker ('22) is used to having to work hard to stand out in a crowd.

All her hours of studying, club meetings and activities, volunteering, playing sports, and working in a local café along with the love and support of her large, enthusiastic family--have made Olivia the impressive young woman that she is today. And what she is today is a scholar who has earned statewide honors that have definitely made her stand out in a crowd.

The daughter of Natalie and Brent Hemker of Hale, Olivia was named a 2022 Coca-Cola Academic Team Bronze Scholar at

the Phi Theta Kappa Michigan Regional Awards event held in Lansing last month and received a \$1000 scholarship. Phi Theta Kappa is an international honor society for students attending community colleges that has 31 chapters in Michigan. Olivia attended the honors event as Alpena Community College's representative on Phi Theta Kappa's All-Michigan Academic Team, which recognizes the top students from Michigan's community colleges.

Accompanied by ACC Dean of Students Nancy Seguin, ACC Director of Housing Cindy DeRocher, along with ACC President Dr. Don MacMaster and his wife, Dr. Tina Rossi, Olivia was not aware when she traveled to the awards ceremony in Lansing last month that she would be honored with such a prestigious award.

"I was very surprised, actually," Olivia shared. "It was super exciting and I thought the best part was how surprised and honored Dr. MacMaster was that one of his students was awarded this honor."

Hemker was nominated by ACC based on her academic achievement, community service involvement, and leadership. To be eligible to be inducted into Phi Theta Kappa, students must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 or higher and have completed at least 12 hours of coursework towards an associate or bachelor's degree or 6 hours of coursework toward a 1-year certificate.

The 2021 Tawas Area High School valedictorian, Olivia is finishing up her thirteenth year in the ACC Early College program and will graduate in May with highest honors from both Tawas Area High School and Alpena Community College. While Olivia could have likely gone off to a four-year school right away and succeeded, the savings on tuition was a major factor in her family's decision to enroll Olivia in the ACC Early College Program.

"I am one of five kids and it is definitely not easy financially to put us all through college," Olivia explained. "So (my parents) decided those of us that could would join the (early college) program, because not only do you get college-class-level work in high school, but you are also sponsored and basically get your associate for free."

She is currently a biochemistry major in the pre-medicine program at ACC and will transfer this fall to the University of Michigan, the alma mater of several family members.

"I chose U of M because of the level of academics and also the environment it provides for its students--along with some family influence," Olivia laughed. "My dad attended

(U of M) as well as my grandma, uncle, and cousin.'

Before heading off to Ann Arbor in the next step to reach her goal of becoming a physician pediatrician or assistant specializing in pediatrics, Olivia will savor her last weeks as a Lumberjack. She has enjoyed her time at the college and thinks highly of the education she earned at ACC.

"I have had a very good experience here at ACC. I didn't really know what to expect...but I can confidently say that it has been incredible attending classes here," Olivia enthused. "From watching my

siblings go through other community Olivia stands with Dr. MacMaster at colleges and having issues with the classes the state PTK awards. being too simple or not geared towards



younger groups, I think ACC has done a really good job with creating a quality education with a goal-oriented support system for its students.'

Olivia is headed to a campus of 45,000 people, but we have no doubt this Lumberjack for Life will once again stand out in the crowd.

#### ACC Alumna & Coach of the Year Cindy DeRocher ('82, 85')



Some people dribble through life, while others pull up for the big shot over and over again. Cindy DeRocher ('82, '85) falls into the latter category.

Named last month as the 2022 women's basketball coach of the year by the Michigan Community College Athletic Association Eastern Conference, Cindy coached the Alpena Community College women's team this season to their most successful record in recent memory, going 13-14 and making the district playoffs.

Her success in her first year as head coach should surprise no one, however. Cindy DeRocher is used to winning.

Coach Cindy DeRocher

As a talented player on the Alcona High School girls'

teams of the last 70s, Cindy and her team made it to the final four of the girls? basketball state championship during Cindy's senior season in 1979. She went on to play for legendary head coach Frank McCourt at ACC, where her teams won 37 games and lost 17 during her two seasons.

In 1988, Cindy started a career as the women's head basketball coach at Trine University in Angola, Indiana. Over twelve seasons, Cindy built a fearsome team, which played in the finals of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletes tournament four times. She won coach of the year titles in 1997 and 1999, as well as the Women's Basketball Coaches Association/NAIA Coach of the Year in 1997. In 2003, Cindy was inducted into the Trine University Athletic Hall of Fame and in 2018, Cindy was welcomed into the Alpena Sports Hall of Fame.

The pull of family eventually led Cindy back home to Northeast Michigan and she became the ACC Director of Student Life & Campus Housing, as well as ACC's athletic director. Unable to stay away from the hardcourt for long, Cindy took on assistant coaching duties for the women's basketball team at ACC in 2020. After just a year, Cindy stepped up into the head coaching position after former coach Bobby Allen moved over to lead the men's team. Cindy built on the success of the previous season and put in an award-winning coaching effort.

In speaking about the honor, Cindy gave her team all the credit.

"This award is reflective of our team's mindset to set goals higher than expectations, and working hard every day to achieve them," DeRocher said.

While her team's hard work paid off on the court, it was Cindy who led them. Among the admirers of her coaching is another former Alcona Tigers basketball player, ACC

#### President Don MacMaster.

"Coach DeRocher deserves great credit for assembling this team and leading them to such an influential season. Both the team and Coach DeRocher made ACC proud," Dr. MacMaster said.

#### Shari Froelich ('75): Nursing a Love of Education

Having just retired, Dr. Froelich has found herself looking back on her long, diverse career in nursing, which began right here at Alpena Community College. She recently rediscovered a picture of her classmates from the class of 1975 and can't help but think of the women who studied alongside her at a time when nursing was very different than it is today.


The Alpena Community College practical nursing class of 1975, to which Shari belongs, graduated 20 LPNs that semester. They were only the third nursing cohort to graduate from ACC's relatively new LPN program, which was rigorous and highly competitive. While she's kept in touch with a few of her classmates, Dr. Froelich would like to reunite with the rest. She recently posted the 1975 ACC practical nursing class photo composite on Facebook, enlisting the public's help to track down her classmates.

ACC's Office of Alumni Relations reached out to Dr. Froelich to see if the college could assist her in reuniting the nursing class of 1975 and discovered there's a lot about her for her classmates to catch up on. After graduating from ACC, Dr. Froelich went on to earn a BS in nursing; master's degrees in nursing administration, business administration, healthcare business, adult primary care, and palliative care nurse practitioner; not to mention a doctorate in nursing practice. If that weren't enough, Dr. Froelich also earned a post-master's certificate in psychiatric mental health. (Clearly this is a woman who understands the value of education.)

With a career that demonstrates how versatile a field the profession has become, Dr. Froelich has worked at all levels of nursing—from bedside care to administrative

work and everything in between--in а multitude of including specialties. psychiatric and behavioral health, pain management, palliative and hospice care. education. breast health, wound care, and case management, just to name a few.

"I landed in a pot of gold," Dr. Froelich says of her decision to



pursue nursing. "It has allowed me to change my focus to so many things without leaving nursing."

Education was the key to Dr. Froelich's career trajectory—and it all started in Van Lare Hall in 1974. Anyone who's worked their way through Alpena Community College's nursing program will tell you that the bonds they forge with their classmates are strong, in large part due to the fact that student go through their program in cohorts, which become more like family as they progress through classes and clinical practica together.


